IELTS – the International English Language Testing System – assesses your level of English. It creates opportunities for you around the world by providing evidence of your language skills.

Why take the IELTS test?

- IELTS is accepted by over 6,000 institutions worldwide, including universities, colleges and employers in English-speaking countries and beyond.
- Almost all universities in Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the UK accept IELTS.
- In the USA, IELTS scores are accepted by thousands of universities and colleges including Ivy League and other top institutions.
- IELTS is used for immigration to Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the UK.
- The test is offered up to four times a month by centres in more than 125 countries.
- Results are available just 13 days after the test.
- IELTS assesses all your skills – reading, writing, listening and speaking.
- IELTS uses Australian, North American and British varieties of English, making it a truly international test.



What level is the test?

IELTS is designed to test English at all levels. This means that anyone can take the test.

There is no such thing as a pass or fail with IELTS. Everyone gets a score to reflect their level of English language ability.

Results are reported as band scores, on a scale from 1 (the lowest) to 9 (the highest) as shown below.

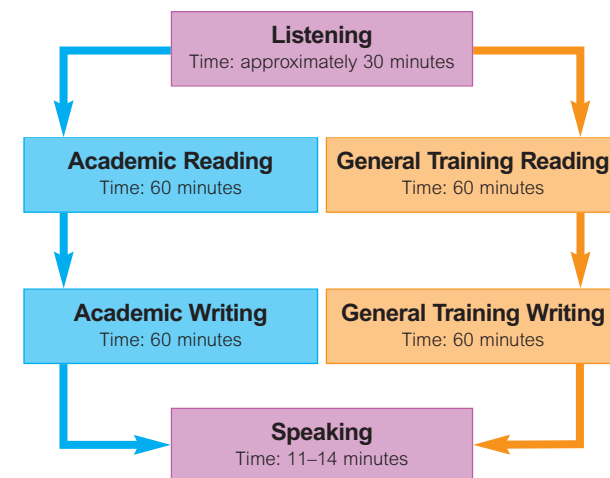
There are two modules – *Academic* and *General Training*. Both are graded using exactly the same criteria, so there is no difference in the level of English. The only difference is the subject matter and type of vocabulary used, which vary to suit the diverse interests of candidates.

The Academic module is for candidates wishing to study at undergraduate or postgraduate levels, or seeking professional registration. The General Training module is for candidates wishing to migrate to an English-speaking country (Australia, Canada, New Zealand, UK), and for those wishing to train or study at below degree level.

Every institution has its own entrance requirements. Contact the institution you are applying to for more information about which module to take and the minimum score they require. For a list of institutions that recognise IELTS worldwide, visit www.ielts.org

What does the test involve?

Both the Academic and General Training modules cover all four language skills – listening, reading, writing and speaking. Everyone takes the same Listening and Speaking parts of the test. There are separate Reading and Writing components for the Academic and General Training modules.



The first three components – Listening, Reading and Writing – must be completed on the same day. The Speaking component may be taken up to seven days before or after the other three components.

Helping you succeed

You do not need to attend a preparation course, but any training you do will increase your chances of a better score. If you would like assistance with test preparation, IELTS centres and language schools around the world offer IELTS preparation courses.
